Washington Week was truly unforgettable. Not only was I able to learn from today's top stateswomen and statesmen, but I also got to learn from the nation's future leaders. In the first evening we had an interactive discussion with Bill Doherty from Braver Angels, a nonprofit dedicated to political depolarization. Amongst our own discussions we heard from leaders from all facets of public service. My favorite speaker was Secretary of Transportation Pete Buttigieg. Secretary Buttigieg left home for college but felt a desire to serve his hometown South Bend, Indiana. He later served as the city's mayor. He noted the importance of acknowledging why we want to serve our city whether it is the people or the places it holds. Both Secretary Buttigieg and Supreme Court Justice Elena Kagan taught me an important lesson: the road to service is a winding one. The rubber ball represents work because it can be dropped and still bounce back. Similarly, Secretary Buttigieg humanized a life in service by mentioning that he had to put a tie on in the morning before he came to speak with us because he is human too.

In addition to profound leaders, I had the experience of taking in the rich history of our nation. Highlights include our visit to George Washington's Mount Vernon, the National Archives, and Arlington Cemetery. Being in the presence of history is a powerful thing; the crisp, morning air at Arlington brings an incomparable sense of gratitude and grief. I also had the once in a lifetime experience of visiting the White House. There we gathered to watch President Joe Biden's State of the Union address, and I will always remember the energy of the room as we clapped along with the in-person audience.
