Throughout my week with the United States Senate Youth Program the 104 student delegates from around the United States heard from many influential speakers who came from a multitude of backgrounds, political ideologies, and cultural values. Due to the diversity of each speaker's background, we got a very clear but distinct message from each person. However, no matter how distinct; how unique; or how extreme the message was that the speaker was trying to impress upon us, one thing was always clear—the most important thing is to care. For us to be successful in a career, we must care about what we do, for our nation to continue to be a powerhouse in the world, our nation's leaders must continue to care, and for us to be a able to fix societal problems, we must care about the people of the world. In short, we learned that caring is the value that will fuel the world's progress.

One speaker that we heard from that truly embodies the spirit of a caring leader was Senator Joe Manchin of West Virginia. After looking through the many resources online, I came to discover that he is a very unique person in our political process. This is because he is one of the last senators left of a dying breed, the Blue Dog Democrats. This was a faction of the Democratic Party that became prevalent in politics in the mid 1990s. Some would describe this faction as a group of "conservative Democrats." The reason why this faction is so important, is that the members of this group play a vital role in bridging the gap between the Republicans and the Democrats. Something that we heard so much about throughout our week at USSYP was the problem of party polarization, and how it is worse now than ever before. Because of this, the role of the Blue Dog Democrats has never been so important. Joe Manchin realizes this, and made sure to enlighten us about the many things he has done to help both the Democratic and Republican parties. When talking about working with his constituents, he even told us that "people don't care how much you know, until they know how much you care."
