### UNITED STATES SENATE RESOLUTION 324

In 1962, Senate Resolution 324, submitted by Senator KUCHEL (for himself and Senators MANSFIELD, DIRKSEN, and HUMPHREY), was referred to the Committee on Rules and Administration, and, subsequently, unanimously approved by the United State Senate as follows:

WHEREAS the continued vitality of our Republic depends, in part, on the intelligent understanding of our political processes and the functions of our National Government by the citizens of the United States: and

WHEREAS the durability of a constitutional democracy is dependent upon alert, talented, vigorous competition for political leadership; and

WHEREAS individual Senators have cooperated with various private and university undergraduate and graduate fellowship and internship programs relating to the work of Congress; and

WHEREAS in the high schools of the United States, there exists among students who have been elected to student body offices in their junior or senior year a potential reservoir of young citizens who are experiencing their first responsibilities of service to a constituency and who should be encouraged to deepen their interest in and understanding of their country's political process: Now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Senate hereby expresses its willingness to cooperate in a nationwide competitive high school Senate youth program which would give several representative high school students from each State a short indoctrination into the operation of the United States Senate and the Federal Government generally, if such a program can be satisfactorily arranged and completely supported by private funds with no expense to the Federal Government.

**RESOLUTION 146.** To amend S. Res. 324 of the Eighty-seventh Congress to provide for the participation of the Department of Defense education system for dependents in overseas areas in the Senate Youth Program.

Resolved, That S. Res. 324, Eighty-seventh Congress, agreed to May 17, 1963, is amended by adding at the end thereof the following new section:

Section 3. For the purpose of this resolution, the term "State" includes the Department of Defense education system for dependents in overseas areas.

he United States Senate Youth Program (USSYP) is an intensive week-long educational experience sponsored by the United States Senate that nurtures an important reservoir of student talent and energy toward the high purpose of public service.

The program was created by Senate Resolution 324 in 1962 as stated in supporting Senate testimony from that year, "to increase young Americans' understanding of the interrelationships of the three branches of government, the caliber and responsibilities of federally elected and appointed officials, and the vital importance of democratic decision making not only for America but for people around the world."

The 61st annual Washington Week brought 104 outstanding high school students — two from every state, the District of Columbia and the Department of Defense Education Activity — to Washington, D.C. to see the federal government up close and meet and interact with those who lead it. As the students develop a deeper commitment to public service, they also form intellectual and emotional bonds with their peers from across the nation.

Administered and funded by The Hearst Foundations since inception, the USSYP utilizes no government funds. The program is highly competitive and merit-based. Qualified students – those already serving in an elected or appointed capacity with excellent academic performance — are nominated by their teachers, principals and guidance counselors and are ultimately selected by their state departments of education. Delegates are each awarded a \$10,000 college scholarship with certificates often personally presented by their U.S. Senators, and are encouraged to continue coursework in history, government and public affairs.

### Welcome to Washington!

nticipation mounts as delegates travel from across the nation and overseas, until they are met at the local airports and train station and brought to the historic Mayflower Hotel. Meeting in person for the first time, students are welcomed by their Military Mentors, USSYP alumni and staff. This year the delegates heard from USSYP alum Bayan Galal (CT—2019), former Yale University undergraduate student body president, who spoke about building upon leadership skills in college and breaking boundaries in doing so.

After dinner, students gather for an in-depth orientation defining program rules, logistics and expectations. They learn new levels of protocol and decorum to fulfill their roles as public representatives of their schools, communities and states. Students are then formally introduced to their Military Mentors, 17 competitively selected officers from each service branch. Two Senior Mentors assist with the overall execution of the program, and 15 smaller groups of students are each assigned one Military Mentor to support and guide them through the exciting and demanding week to come.

The United States Senate Youth Alumni Association (ussyaa.org) has forged and maintained ties with thousands of program alumni. In addition to ongoing activities throughout the year, alumni gather during Washington Week for the association's annual dinner and board meeting.

Create a Rising Tide That Raises All Ships

enator John Hickenlooper of Colorado delighted the delegates with stories from his multifaceted past, counseling the delegates to immerse themselves in "real life" work and business experience before launching into politics. His own varied résumé includes education in creative writing and geology, as well as brew pub entrepreneur, mayor, governor, film actor and banjo expert. His instincts to work toward the greater good were honed as a successful businessman and local elected official. Whether devising a marketing plan that included his restaurant competitors in downtown Denver, or in deciding early on to run no political attack ads, he was guided by the principle that "A rising tide raises all ships." He saw the pitfalls of political mudslinging through a business lens, saying "that diminishes the entire product category of politics and democracy — of what this country stands for. We've got to bring our democracy together." Fact-based creative bipartisan solutions are his strategy. As governor during the horrific Aurora theater shooting, he responded with a plan for a national firearm safety board, modeled on the success of the National Highway Transportation Safety Board. "There may be two sides to the gun issue," he opined, "but it's one America. We've got to find our way to some common solutions."

Enjoying dinner with the group, Senator Hickenlooper highlighted the importance of camaraderie: "Something magical happens when you eat, when you break bread," he noted, hoping to bolster that same feeling among his colleagues in the Senate. Colorado delegate Dana Ko lauded the dynamic USSYP Co-Chair, offering his example as a road map. "Your journey from writing to entrepreneurship has taught us that a path with a diversity of interests can lead us to be better public servants."

Remember to Always Look Up

enator Shelley Moore Capito gazed appreciatively at her surroundings in the rotunda of the National Archives as she began. "Who gets to have dinner with the Bill of Rights, the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution? They are all living documents, and they are living right here with us tonight." She shared that she was proud to be speaking before America's future leaders and told the students that a good approach is to work for a local official or candidate who champions issues that you believe in. The first female Senator in West Virginia history offered this advice: "Most people in the public eye are great talkers, but the real gift is to be a good listener. If you are not listening, you are probably not going to be a good leader." She also counseled the delegates to "look up" both in the philosophical and pragmatic sense. "Remember to observe and appreciate your surroundings and make old fashioned eye-to-eye

and voice-to-voice contact, because those are the ways that you will be able to cement your relationships with mentors and peers." Compromise is also key. The Senator shared her firsthand experience working with President Biden on the recently passed bipartisan infrastructure bill. "No one got everything they wanted, " she said. "You must be willing to compromise. Refusing to work together out of principle just penalizes the whole country." Discussing the progress being made electing women leaders and her own role in history, Senator Capito relayed an expression she heard early on: "If you can see it, you can be it." West Virginia delegate Hank Phillips ended the evening noting that his home state deeply appreciates Senator Capito's "dedication to solving some of our country's most pressing issues in a bipartisan manner and steering the United States to a more perfect union," referencing an iconic phrase from the founding documents directly behind the podium.

### The Principles of the Enlightenment Holding True

istinguished alum Judge Robert Henry's kickoff speaking event has been a cherished tradition of the USSYP for nearly 20 years. The former Chief Judge opened the first in-person Washington Week Monday presentation since the start of the pandemic – and his message was hopeful. His long tenure at the highest ranks of the Judicial branch set the stage for the group visit to the Supreme Court later that day, and his former posts as Oklahoma state legislator and state attorney general further informed his perspective on government, politics and the law. He held aloft a copy of the book Enlightenment Now by Harvard psychologist Steven Pinker, encouraging the students to remember and commit themselves to the core principles upon which America was founded. Our founding leaders "were concerned with reason, science, humanism and progress," and were not "held in lockstep with old ideas," Judge Henry noted. An open-minded, multi-disciplinary thought process is needed now more than ever to tackle our nation's challenges, he posited, pointing to Pinker's datadriven thesis of the Enlightenment's enormous historical success around the globe. Judge Henry discussed the bedrock role of the Judiciary in providing stability in uncertain times. "This country is planted thick with laws; most of them are good. I hope you will leave this tremendous gathering with a new commitment to following the law that has made this country so very great and the envy of the world." Oklahoma delegate Raven Owens applauded Judge Henry in her closing remarks: "He has lived by the philosophy that public service is the rent you pay for the space you occupy." Fellow delegate Tuga Alibadi agreed: "He has proven to us the potential we all hold."



### Sonia Sotomayor

### Never Give Up Your Chance to Keep Fighting for Change

onia Sotomayor transformed many delegates' notions of meeting an associate justice of the U.S. Supreme Court. Her compassion and warmth instantly put the students at ease in the vaunted Supreme Courtroom as she moved from aisle to aisle, greeting them personally and inquiring about their home states and towns. Her life's trajectory, from a Bronx, New York, housing project raised by a single mother to attending Princeton University, informed her empathy for others, her understanding of injustice, and her desire to serve through the law. "The law seemed like the perfect way to serve, because it is the structure of how people relate to each other," she noted, emphasizing the personal fulfillment gained by a life of service. She advised the students to never be afraid to ask questions or think that doing so is a sign of weakness, telling them to ask successful people for help and guidance and remember, "There is a difference between ignorance and stupidity." The importance of maintaining civility at the Court and in life is paramount, she offered, saying "We must listen to each other's perspectives without labeling anyone - accept disagreement while seeing the goodness in each other." When asked what gives her hope, the first Hispanic and third woman to serve on the High Court cited awareness, fighting for what is right and the delegates themselves: "Don't let others rule you. Don't be a bystander in life. I know that someday one of you or someone like you will replace me, and that is enough for me."

enate officers provide the cornerstone and continuum of the legislative body, and the delegates met two of these groundbreaking public servants. Ann Berry served as a senior Senate staff member for more than four decades before being elected the first African American Secretary of the Senate in 2021, and Elizabeth MacDonough serves as the first female Senate Parliamentarian. Both passionately encouraged the students to continue their commitment to public service. "Our government is a living, breathing creature," Ms. MacDonough said, "Most anyone can make government function, but it takes commitment, ideas, inspiration and innovation to make it thrive." Secretary Berry advised not to "focus so much on a specific destination as on the journey itself. The journey is the choices you make, large and small, the people you encounter, famous and familiar, heroes and villains alike." She described her staff colleagues as "The unsung heroes of our republic, drawn not to fame and glory but to the quiet, professional, essential mission of supporting our institutions of government on good and bad days alike." Strengthening personal connections is key. "A lot of our job is listening," Ms. MacDonough explained. People inherently "want to be heard." "Nothing will help you bond with someone more than sitting around in a quorum call at four o'clock in the morning, and maybe on your third day in a row at four o'clock in the morning." They both hoped that Washington Week would expose attendees to the wide range pf public service pathways. "You may come away from this visit with a new or revised vision of what you want your educational focus or career path to be, and if that means federal service, well, that will be wonderful," the Senate Parliamentarian concluded.

#### **SENATE HISTORIAN**

#### **LIBRARIAN OF CONGRESS**

### Betty Koed & Carla Hayden

r. Carla Hayden, the 14th Librarian of Congress since 1802, welcomed the delegates to the Library's Madison Building. She defined librarians as "The original search engines – and the anchors in so many communities." Dr. Hayden, the first African American and first woman to hold the office, fielded questions on a range of subjects, including disinformation, book-banning and the digitization of media in the modern age, noting that efforts to ban books usually only serve to

increase sales. Dr. Betty Koed, the first female historian of the United States

Senate, began her address by defining the term: "History can be everchanging. It is also your personal story. Everyone has a history, and each of us interprets our own past." Dr. Koed has worked to reveal a deeper, more complete history of both the Senate and the country. Early in her tenure, she noted the lack of female senators' photos showcased in her office. She added images of icons such as Senator Margaret Chase Smith. Investigating early Congressional records that had escaped destruction by the British in 1812, the heroics of Tobias Simpson, a Black Senate messenger, came to light. Prior to this research, it had been falsely assumed that there were no Black Senate employees until after the Civil War. "It's the history we share as a community that pulls us together as a nation," she said. California delegate Fiona Lu offered appreciation: "Dr. Koed's service teaches

us both about the momentous victories and the ugly truths of history to

## U.S. Institute of Peace and State Department Luncheon

he sundrenched George P. Schultz Great Hall of the United States Institute of Peace (USIP) was the setting for Washington Week's annual luncheon focusing on diplomacy and foreign policy. USIP President and CEO Lise Grande welcomed the group with an overview of USIP's more than 300 peacebuilding initiatives worldwide, covering 19 conflict zones in 90 countries. "When I worked for the United Nations, I served on the front lines in 12 wars. I don't know anyone who has ever been in a war that did not profoundly believe that peace was a better option," she remarked. Numerous State Department and USIP officials joined the delegates over lunch to discuss the many facets of statecraft, global policymaking and careers in Foreign Service. State Department Ambassador Dereck Hogan, Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary in the Bureau of European and Eurasian Affairs, and Dr. Michael Yaffe, vice president of the Middle East North Africa Center at USIP recounted their notable international experiences

as representatives of the United States abroad. The lengthy Q&A session included ideas about entering the diplomatic corps, the role of the U.N. Security Council in today's geopolitical environment, the rising influence of authoritarian governments and the conflict in Ukraine. Ambassador Hogan





## Republican Perspective Lunch with Senator John Thune of South Dakota

enator John Thune of South Dakota, the Senate's assistant minority leader in his role as Republican Whip, jumped into discussion with the delegates with enthusiasm. "I am a believer that we need young people who not only have attributes that are necessary to do well in public life, but also the desire and sense of duty and responsibility. We must have people who are willing to roll up their sleeves, do the work and try to make this country stronger for future generations." Regarding polarization, the senior Senator from the Mount Rushmore state urged delegates to maintain their principles as guardrails but to "search for common ground within those boundaries. You've got to be a good listener," he advised. "You must diversify your sources of information to understand another side's perspective, whether you agree or not, to find compromise." The 2023 Alumni on the Hill speaker Rachel Skaar (USSYP MT – 2014), press secretary to Senator Michael Bennet of Colorado, spoke from the heart about overcoming "imposter syndrome" during Washington Week, in college and during her early career. She urged delegates to build needed confidence: "Each and every one of you have something so unique and valuable to bring to the table," she assured, with a wide smile, an evident example of the power of positive thinking, talent and hard work.

#### **DIRECTOR OF NATIONAL INTELLIGENCE**

### **Avril Haines**

vril Haines, the first woman to lead the U.S. Intelligence Community, described how her agency was formed in the aftermath of 9/11 with "the urgent need to bridge fault lines within our government and between foreign and domestic. intelligence. We are better defended today against terrorist attacks because of that reorganization." Her responsibilities include helping to prepare the President's Daily Brief, a summary and analysis of the current security landscape for the commander in chief. Covering this vast array of issues is a highlight of her job. "I am constantly learning, every day, and that makes me feel alive, working alongside extraordinary professionals who are committed to protecting and serving the American people." Maintaining objectivity is also essential. "We value and believe our job is to speak truth to power. Politicized intelligence simply reinforces preexisting beliefs and deprives the leaders of our country a foundation for developing sound policy." She recognized that many of the delegates would soon begin their college and career paths and offered this: "We need people who can bring fresh perspectives and ideas. If you think you don't have the right skills or interest to join the Intelligence Community, I think you may be surprised to learn what we do every day," she said, noting that national security includes a focus on such diverse fields as climate change, global public health and emerging technologies. The students were able to ask many questions, of both Director Haines and Ms. Stephanie La Rue, ODNI chief of diversity, equity and inclusion, who joined the comprehensive presentation.

#### **U.S. SURGEON GENERAL**

### Dr. Vivek Murthy

.S. Surgeon General Dr. Vivek Murthy offered his vison for a new consciousness in America. "We need a new generation that is clear-minded and unapologetic about fighting for the core values of kindness, generosity, service and love. This is a generation defined by spirit rather than age, with a core commitment to recognizing that when we are at our best, all of us are lifted up." He cited statistics about anxiety, depression and loneliness in America, especially among youth, positing that we are living in an "epidemic of loneliness" impacting performance in school, the workplace and civic engagement. Dr. Murthy delved into the intrinsic connection between mental and physical health, underlying his impassioned vision for the future. "We must aspire to be a nation of kind neighbors, of compassionate citizens, of loving parents and of courageous, resilient kids. To me that is a strong nation, one that increases the likelihood that we can all prosper, and one that serves as a beacon of light for other countries." The leader of the Public Health Service and the "Nation's Doctor," Dr. Murthy has served as surgeon general under the past three presidents. He told the delegates much about his own life story and advised them to embrace uncertainty and display resilience. "Life will always be full of surprises. It will throw curveballs at you. Some of them will be delightful surprises. Some of them will be terrifying. But being open to those surprises, being open to where they take us can often make all the difference in the fulfillment we experience and the

# The Department of Defense



eneral Mark Milley welcomed the 2023 delegates to the Pentagon with these words: "There are three things you must develop: character, courage and competence. These will form your moral and intellectual core and help you face the crucibles of life." The 20th Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, the nation's highest-ranking military officer and principal military advisor to the president, Secretary of Defense and National Security Council. defined the soul of our nation. "You can draw a straight line from the Magna Carta through the Enlightenment to the U.S. Constitution," he said, "a document that is so extraordinarily powerful that it struck fear and shockwaves into the hearts of kings and gueens, dictators and fascists. based on the idea of equality." Throughout his career, the Constitution has been his "North Star" he said, reminding the delegates that the military members surrounding them were willing to die to ensure its protections. General Milley acknowledged the constant process of forming a more perfect union, and concluded, "All that I ask of you is that you carry that forward and serve your country in some fashion." Arizona delegate Emma Curtright reflected on General Milley's remarks. "He really inspired a love for my country, for service and for my fellow man. He said, 'We take an oath to a document that represents an idea that all of us will be free and equal.' It doesn't matter what we look like, where we come from... things we can't control." Delegate Matthew Stevens of New York said, "General Milley's message of service above self and sacrifice for others truly resonated with me."

Speaking next was Ramón Colón-López, the Senior Enlisted Advisor to the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, the most senior enlisted service member in the Armed Forces. He combined policy expertise with sharp wit and guick humor, for a memorable interaction and generous time for questions and answers about all of the armed forces service branches. Dr. Mara Karlin, published author and Assistant Secretary of Defense for Strategies, Plans and Capabilities, gave the students a deep dive into military budget and strategic planning, and an overview of her work developing the National Defense Strategy. Dr. Karlin offered education and life advice, especially touting the benefits of being open to unexpected opportunities, using her own career path, beginning as a Congressional intern to her current position as a shining example.





The Department of Justice

steemed USSYP alumnus Robert Henry, former chief judge of the U.S. Tenth Circuit Court of Appeals, told the students to "follow the law that has made this country great and the envy of the world." An insider's view of the law from the Executive branch was held the next day, when the group was hosted for a multifaceted educational event at the Robert F. Kennedy Department of Justice Building. Seated in the Great Hall, the students first heard from Librarian Robin

Foltz, who described the history of the building and

the magnificent Greco Deco artwork and design. She revealed nuances of the massive frescoes and portraits from the New Deal era depicting great codifiers of the law and allegories of the majesty of justice and perils of lawlessness. Assistant Attorney General for Civil Rights Kristen Clarke spoke next, beginning by stating the department's mission: to uphold the rule of law, keep the country safe and protect civil rights. A lifelong civil rights lawyer who has spent her entire career in public service, Ms. Clarke relayed several of her ongoing priorities including combating hate crime and hate speech and ensuring voting rights so that "every American can cast a ballot free from discrimination and harassment." She draws strength in her work from great figures in America's Civil Rights Movement such as the late Congressman John Lewis and former UN Secretary General Ban Ki-Moon, whose words she quoted as inspiration: "Throughout human history, in every great endeavor, we have learned that it is only through seriousness of purpose and persistence that you win the day." A panel discussion with several of the Department's leading lawyers from the Housing and Civil Enforcement, Special Litigation, Criminal, Human Trafficking and Prosecution, and Educational Opportunities sections ensued, with members taking in-depth questions. Following the visit, Ella Duus of Alabama said, "This eve-opening experience has sparked a newfound interest in civil rights work, and I am now eager to explore this field during my time in college."



## Australian Ambassador Suzanne McCourt

A Relationship Built on Values

perspective on America from abroad is a core facet of Washington Week, and the 2023 delegates were honored to hear from Ambassador Suzanne McCourt, Australia's Minister-Counselor and Congressional Liaison in Washington, D.C. Ambassador McCourt draws inspiration from her varied international experiences and the importance of diplomacy. "I've been to a range of places, and that for me is the joy of being a diplomat. We are the soft side of power; we talk, negotiate, understand and communicate. It is very different to the hard power side of things, and it's an absolute privilege to represent your country in this way." She commented on Australia's special friendship with the U.S. "The relationship is so robust because it is built on values. It's built on belief in democracy, on good governance, the rule of law, respect for human rights, a commitment to gender equality and the protection of freedom of expression." She described numerous areas of collaboration between Australia and the United States including in the arts and sciences, in addition to matters of defense and security. "We have over 400 people at our embassy in Washington because there are so many parts of the government that need to talk to each other." A bit of Aussie slang was used to further describe the rapport between our nations, "We often just call each other friends or, to use an Australian term, 'mates' because we have so much in common," she smiled. Ambassador McCourt answered a wide range of questions, touching on climate change, refugee policies, electoral processes and economic and defensive alliances, noting that many students in the room would likely be working in a role such as hers one day.

ournalist and author Soledad O'Brien brought enthusiasm and wisdom to the podium for the USSYP annual Journalism Luncheon, and ultimately incorporated the entire experience into her show, Matter of Fact with Soledad O'Brien to the delight of all. She described her early career strategy as leading with "yes"; by often volunteering for assignments that were not in her job description. She found that "Doing so put you in rooms with interesting people, gave you the opportunity to build your résumé and forced you to do things that were a bit scary. But that would grow your skillset every day." Responding to Mississippi delegate Joshua Bowman

about navigating obstacles, her advice was not to avoid the emotions

associated with failure. "The minute it happens, you can say that was terrible. Let's embrace it. Clearly, I am supposed to learn something from this." Ms. O'Brien quoted her mother when a setback occurred. "She said you get 24 hours. Take 24 hours to cry, sit in bed, whatever you want to do, but then start making a list of next steps." Ms. O'Brien urged America's future leaders to fight against misinformation and disinformation. "I beg of you to elevate facts and honesty," she said, highlighting journalism's role "to hold people in power accountable, reflect all of the community, make sure that all voices are being heard and bring facts into context." Texas delegate Sonya Kulkarni commended the award-winning

anchor and host in her appreciation: "Journalism is more important now than ever in ensuring that the truth is preserved and sanctified."










## Family, Foundation, Legacy

🕔 or 61 years, the United States Senate Youth Program has brought thousands of America's brightest young leaders to Washington, returning them home with insight into the history and heritage of their democracy and encouragement to be leaders of the future. Each year the students leave with lasting impressions of their week including new friendships and bonds that many term "life-changing."

#### 1820

An exemplar of American success, George Hearst, born in 1820, went west to seek a future in mining, and developed the family fortune, He served in the California State Legislature representing San Francisco and was appointed to the U.S. Senate in 1886 and served until his death in 1891. His wife. pioneering philanthropist Phoebe Apperson Hearst, distinguished herself as one of America's most accomplished women, dedicated to historic, educational and children's causes. She co-founded the National Parent Teachers Association in 1897 and was instrumental in the reclamation and rehabilitation of George Washington's Mount Vernon property.

#### 1863

William Randolph Hearst, their only child, was born in 1863 and became one of the great legends of American journalism, establishing vast media holdings at the forefront of new communications technologies, including radio, television and specialty magazines, and becoming an avid student of history and politics. Hearst newspapers detailed the history of the 20th century, and his public service included two terms as a Democratic Congressman from New York. During his life he gave millions of dollars to colleges, hospitals, kindergartens and museums, and in the decade before his death he established the charitable foundations that bear his name.

#### 1962

The United States Senate Youth Program was envisioned by William Randolph Hearst's sons, George R. Hearst and Randolph A. Hearst, who worked with the Senate leadership of the day – Senators Kuchel, Mansfield, Dirksen and Humphrey – to establish and authorize the program in 1962. Since inception, the Senate majority and minority leaders and the vice president of the United States have served as the program's Honorary Co-Chairs; two senators, one of each party, serve as annual Co-Chairs and an eight-senator bipartisan panel serves as the annual Advisory Committee.

#### 2019

For more than 70 years, The Hearst Foundations have continued to support numerous charitable organizations across the country in the fields of education, health, culture and social service. The Foundations' two flagship initiatives are the United States Senate Youth Program and the annual William Randolph Hearst Journalism Awards Program, founded in 1960, to encourage journalistic excellence and to support education at accredited undergraduate schools of journalism nationwide.
